





















Paws, Claws and Whiskers

1	sculpture	A 3D object made by chiselling, modelling or carving from a material.	
2	sculptor	An artist who creates sculptures.	
3	coil	To wind something into circles.	
4	print	A shape that is marked or pressed onto a surface.	
5	pattern	An arrangement of shapes, lines or colours that can be repeated or used again and again.	

B Science Vocabulary 			
1	wildlife	An animal that does not live with humans.	
2	carnivore	An animal that eats just meat.	
3	herbivore	An animal that eats just plants.	
4	omnivore	An animal that eats both meat and plants.	
5	scales	Small, hard, thin plates that cover animals such as fish and snakes.	
6	fur	The soft thick hair that covers the bodies of animals, such as a cat or fox.	
7	spikes	Outgrowths on an animal, such as a hedgehog, that protect it.
